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Core Concepts

Projective identification and transference/countertransference are interrelated topics, central to Kleinian theorizing:

- Ogden, T. views projective identification as a group of fantasies accompanying object relations involving three phases which together make up a single psychological unit.
- Ogden, T. states: "Projective identification is a psychological process that is at once a type of defense, a mode of communication, a primitive form of object relations, and a pathway for psychological change."

Some authors like Racker connected the analyst's countertransference response to the projective identification on the part of the patient.

- Racker, H. declares that the analyst's identification with the object with which the patient identifies the analyst is the normal countertransference process. He makes a distinction between concordant and complementary identification on the part of the analyst.
- Joseph, Betty, refers to the concept of transference as a total situation.

The goal of these seminars is to introduce you to Self Psychology, which is one of the contemporary schools of psychoanalysis developed by Heinz Kohut and a group of his colleagues. In these seminars, we will tackle the following questions:

What was so revolutionary about self psychology when it emerged at a time when drive theory (ego psychology) dominated psychoanalysis in North America?

What problems in psychoanalysis did Kohut perceive and was trying to correct? How did self psychology achieve this? How did the specific shift in the analyst's stance to their patients influence how analysts worked with their patients or build theory out of their analytic work?

What is the self and why might it be an important clinical target in psychoanalysis or psychoanalytic treatments?

What did self psychology contribute to our understanding of transference?

What was it about self psychology that made narcissistic personality disorder – a previously "untreatable" condition – "treatable" and "curable."

Extending to other clinical problems, what did self psychology and a focus on "the self" add to our understanding of psychopathology?
